Prerequisites	A student should graduate from the Bachelor studies.			
Aims	The subject aims to continue mastering the language skills such as speaking, listening, reading and writing, with emphasis on the active use of language. The theoretical part of the course introduces students to modern language learning methodology that takes into consideration the interconnectedness and impact of a national language and culture. In this sense, the subject includes 2 hours of teaching theories and 6 hours of practical exercises (speech, translation from Russian into Russian with linguistic and stylistic analysis).			
Learning outcomes	After passing this exam a student will be able to: - Master all four Russian language skills (listening, speaking, reading and writing to level C1) - Become familiar with the conceptual and linguistic picture of the world of native speakers of the Russian language; - Identify linguistic units having cultural connotation; - Potentially use the language to achieve communicative goals, audience management (expressing opinions, agreement/disagreement, desires, requests, demands) - Possess skills of the textual analysis; - Independently use appropriate textbooks and scientific literature, bibliographic sources and contemporary internet resources
